Summary:

SEAIP 2021 attracted 97 registrants coming from 16 different countries, including Philippines, Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore, China, India, and many more. This conference featured 2 keynote and 7 plenary speakers, who are all pioneers of indigenous psychology worldwide, such as Dr Louise Sundararajan, Dr Rogelia Pe-Pua, and many other esteemed psychologists from US, Canada, Taiwan, China, and Malaysia. The conference received 35 abstract submissions, and 16 of them were accepted for presentation during the conference. Additionally, 7 full papers were received for Early Career Researchers Awards, and 3 were selected to receive the Best Paper Awards after being rigorously reviewed by the SEAIP Scientific Committee. As an outcome, this conference yielded 4 research clusters, with a total of 52 cluster members. A facebook group
